We also take the opportunity to thank Mr. Henry (Peck) Bazner for his splendid cooperation with the coach.

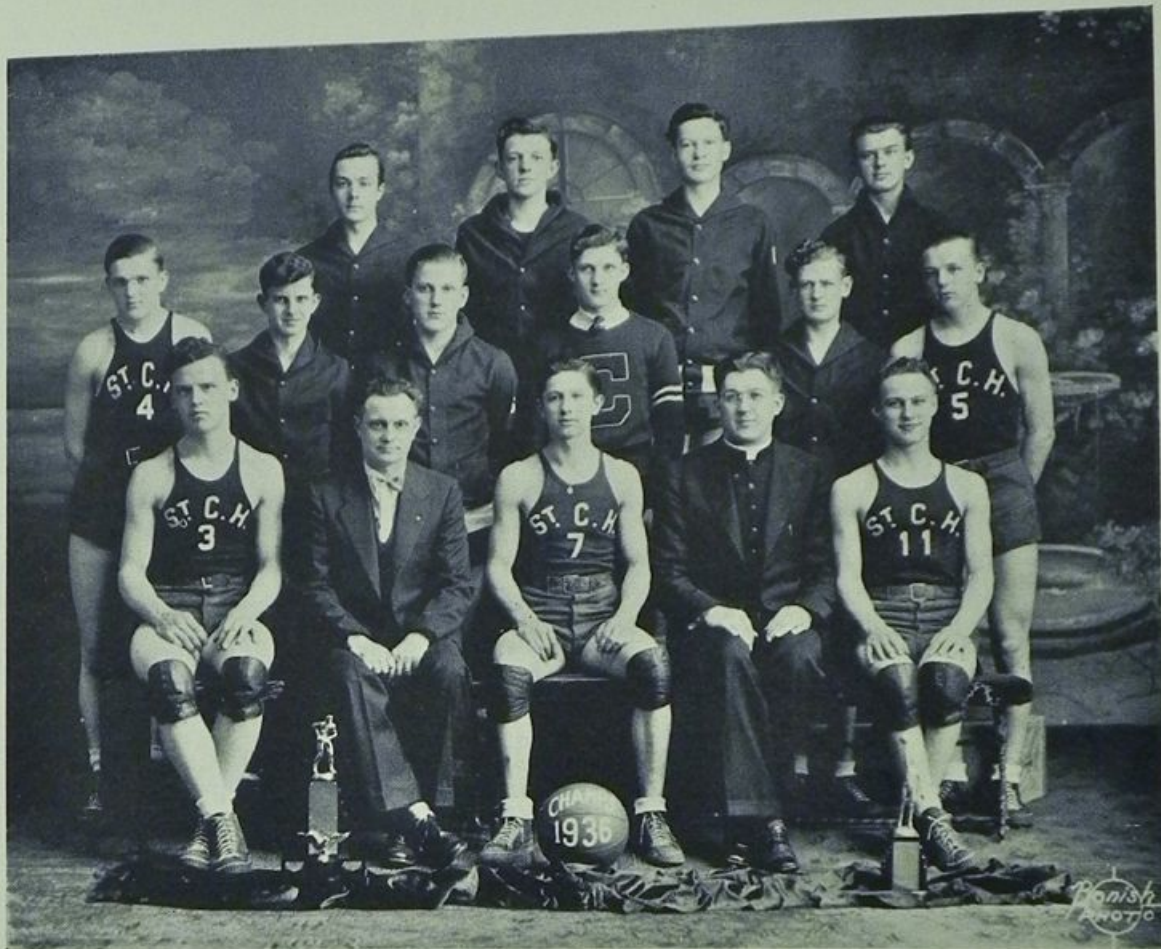

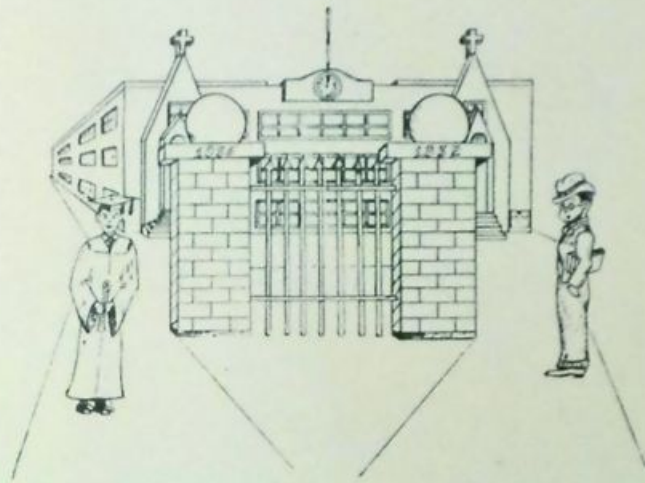
